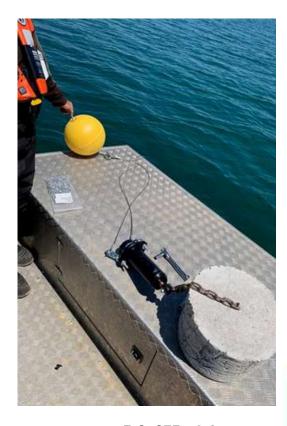
FISH HARVESTERS NEEDED



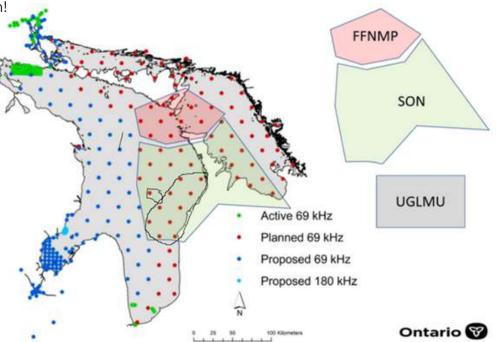
As part of the Together with Giigoonyag initiative, the Fisheries Assessment Program will be coordinating the deployment of 9 acoustic telemetry receivers in Lake Huron during the week of August 8-12.

We are looking to hire a SON fish harvester with a TUG to aid us for \$2450/day for up to 3 days. Duties will include dropping individual receivers weighed down by cement blocks (90-130lbs) into pre-determined locations approximately 22km apart (Red dots circled in yellow below).

If you are interested in deploying receivers please notify the Fisheries Assessment Program for consideration. We will be selecting one interested individual at random next week. Miigwetch!

INDEX NETTING CONTRACT

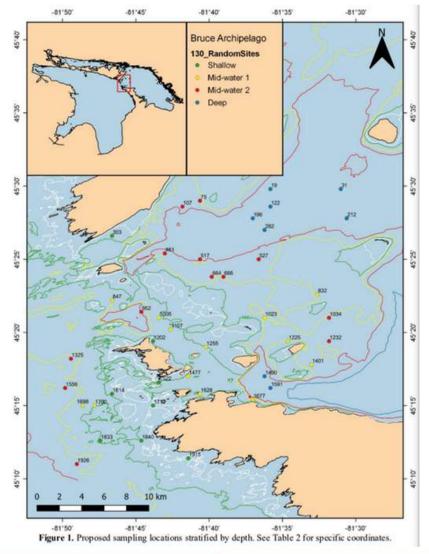
As part of the **Together with Giigoonyag** initiative, we will be conducting index netting around Tobermory with Parks Canada starting the first week of August.

This work is expected to continue in the future and will provide opportunities for SON fish harvesters in years to come. In total, we anticipate 7 days of work. Each day 5 index nets will be set (approx. 1600 feet each). Predetermined locations and their GPS coordinates can be found on the following 2 pages.



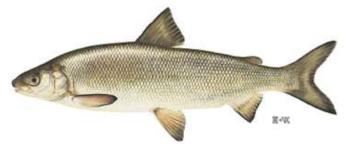
Parks Canada will supply the nets and equipment that will be required to conduct this work.

ACOUSTIC RECEIVER LOCATIONS

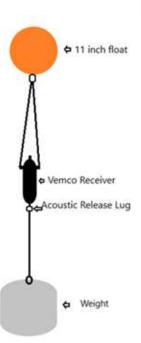


One component of the Bima'azh project, which aims to track fine-scale movements of spawning lake whitefish, is acoustic telemetry. An acoustic telemetry system consists of two main components: transmitters and receivers. Transmitters are electronic tags that broadcast a series of "pings" (sound pulses) into the surrounding water. These tags are surgically implanted into fish of interest. Listening stations (receivers) are placed on the bottom of the lake at various locations to "listen" for tagged fish as they swim by. Similar to efforts last year, 11 receivers have been redeployed along the Port Elgin Shoal.

There is the potential that these receivers may become caught in fishing gear. Receivers positioned in shallow nearshore areas have been identified with net markers. To avoid this kind of interference, we are also providing you with the locations of all currently installed receivers along the shoal.

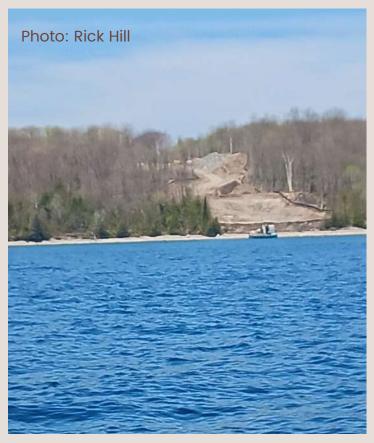
